Philly area is the nation's <u>4th worst asthma capital</u> ...and Philly has the <u>highest cancer rate</u> among the 10 largest cities in the U.S.

Closing these "big 10" industrial polluters in our area would be equivalent to taking 90% of the cars and trucks off of Philadelphia's roads, in terms of the nitrogen oxide pollution that triggers asthma attacks.

What must we do?

1) Make sure that the PES oil refinery is not reopened

Support Philly Thrive and others advocating for an end to polluting industry on the refinery site, and a safe on-site cleanup.

- No continued oil refining. No biorefinery (biofuels are a polluting false solution). Clean energy jobs only.
- Clean up without further exposing the community or simply relocating toxic soil to a weaker community.

2) Stop Philly from burning trash

Support Energy Justice Network and our member groups in the impacted communities surrounding the city. Mayor Kenney and Philadelphia City Council ignored the emphatic call by 41 environmental, public health, social justice, and business organizations to end incineration – and in June, the city signed contracts to continue burning much of our waste for the next 4-7 years – primarily in nearby Chester City, home to the nation's largest waste incinerator – and known as the worst case of environmental racism in the nation.

- These four are primarily responsible for the decision to keep burning Philly's trash:
 - o Scott McGrath (Philadelphia Streets Department contract writer)
 - Carlton Williams (Philadelphia Streets Department Commissioner)
 - Nic Esposito (Mayor's "Zero Waste" and Litter Cabinet)
 - o Christine Knapp (Mayor's Director of Sustainability)
- Before the contract comes up for its first 1-year renewal option in 2023, we must replace these bureaucrats or get them properly informed of the fact that incineration is by far the most polluting way to manage our waste, and must be ended.



The <u>childhood asthma hospitalization rate in Chester is three times the state average</u>, and this incinerator contributes to high asthma rates in Philadelphia as well. Emitting many other toxic pollutants, it also <u>contributes to heart attacks</u>, <u>strokes</u>, <u>cancers</u>, <u>learning</u> <u>disabilities</u>, and many other health problems.

There is no need to burn trash. Between this incinerator and others in the state, Philadelphia burns nearly half of its trash. <u>Trash</u> <u>incineration is the most expensive and polluting way to manage waste or to make energy</u>. We can do better! We must end incineration and work toward a real Zero Waste approach that gets serious about reducing, reusing, recycling and composting discarded materials.
